

MEMBERS' UPDATE

Dear AnglicareSA Members,

Around 40,000 children and young people across Australia spent this Christmas in state care, with more than 3,000 of these in South Australia.

The number of children in out of home care in SA has risen by almost 100 percent in the past 10 years. This compares to a rise of 50 percent across Australia. We are failing to stem the flow of children being removed from their families and entering and remaining in care.

Agencies like ours who deal with the impacts of this crisis every day through frontline care and family programs know that we have long needed a circuit breaker to stem the tide of children entering the care system and enable the focus to be placed on prevention and early intervention.

Rather than increasing services to support children after they are removed, the priority should be on information, education and support to enable families to parent properly. But this will require both courage and the ability and commitment to divert funds to where they will have the most impact.

That is why the South Australian Government's recent announcement of a \$2.8 million investment in AnglicareSA's Intensive Family Intervention Service for children at risk is so heartening. It presents an unprecedented opportunity to create an alternative future for how the state enables at risk families to keep their children safe.

It will not be a quick fix. With 150,000 children the subject of notifications each year across Australia, reversing the increasing flow of children into care will not happen overnight. However, the Intensive Family Intervention Service can be the first significant step on a journey to overhaul and refocus a system toward early intervention and preventative support for families.

Our work at AnglicareSA has shown us repeatedly that, when faced with the risk of losing their children, many families will work hard to get back on track and this program will help them to do just that.

Beyond the primary objective of safeguarding children and supporting families, it is hoped the Intensive Family Intervention Service will generate sufficient savings to fund system redesign squarely focussed on early intervention and prevention.

As a state, we must prioritise enabling failing families to function well. This is key to improving the lives of children, the health of our communities, and to preventing future budget blowouts. Investing in programs specifically designed to reduce the removal of children and promote their return home is a clear financial win for the state. Most importantly, it is a huge win for vulnerable South Australian children and their families.

Cycle of Change program aims to deliver support in learning and employment pathways to disadvantaged youth in Adelaide's northern suburbs. The program combines both vocational and non-vocational workshops integrated with BMX riding.

Maree let staff know that she "dreamed of being a super model" and "to be beautiful for one day so people would love her".


So the staff went about making that happen.

As part of her make-over staff took Maree shopping to find a new outfit, had her hair styled by a staff member, and got a make-up artist and photographer together for a special day.



While getting her makeup done, Maree announced that 'no one had ever done anything nice for her' – which had staff fighting back tears.
